Launch of Lunch Club

The new Overton Lunch Club had its inaugural lunch at the White Horse Inn on Wednesday 10th February. Promoted by Age Concern in conjunction with Wrexham County Borough Council, lunch club development is high on the agenda especially in rural areas. Chris Brownridge of Age Concern said that there were now 28 lunch clubs operating in the County. They are markedly different from previous lunch clubs which were run by volunteers who also cooked the meals. The new clubs are

different by going into pubs and clubs, where the food is prepared by the pub or club for a reasonable price.

White Horse landlord Steve Dodwell said he was delighted to host the new Lunch Club. In total 28 club members attended the lunch and enjoyed a two course lunch of Chicken, Ham and Leek Pie with potatoes and veg, followed by apple and mixed fruit crumble.

The Overton Lunch Club will meet on the second Wednesday every month, and the next meeting will be on 12.30pm on **March 10th**. Anyone wishing to join the lunch club, can do so by ringing Gwynneth Austin on 710672.



Mystery at the Village Hall

Thursday Feb 4th saw the first night of Overton Am Dram's performances of 'Agatha Crispie' (it's a parody, not a typo) directed by Cynthia Davies. Set in Southern England, just after WW 2, the plot centres on Agatha, an unpublished mystery writer and the dynamics in her family.

Debating were Bruce Young playing both Chief Inspector Bland and Sir Henry Dithering, and Roxanne Haynes who gave a creditable performance as Elvira Walloman, the spoilt debutante and step-daughter of Agatha. Mervyn Haynes was solid as usual as were the rest of the cast with two exceptions...

Ann Kynaston's interpretation of 'Pimms', Agatha's downtrodden but faithful maid, stole the show with her utterly convincing portrayal. Her performance brought spontaneous applause and her off script ad-libbing was comic. With Ann being one exception, the other nameless character was guilty of the worst overacting I have ever witnessed - there was less ham than in the film 'Babe'. However, this being a mystery, you will have to deduce exactly who the guilty party is yourself ...

Adding to the atmosphere were the Derwen School visitors whose generous appreciation and autograph hunting added to the atmosphere and enjoyment. Also in attendance were Bob Hughes and his partner from Llandegfan, Yns Mon, who, being distantly related to the author Cenarth Fox, had travelled over especially to take in the performance and gave very favourable comments.

Overall it was an excellent performance and a thoroughly enjoyable night. The best line though, came not from the play, but from the Director's other half, who, when I asked if he would be supporting from the wings, looked at me dead-pan and replied "Na, I'm not. I don't do amateurs"..... Genius.

Ramblings From the Rectory *by David Lewis*

Dear Friends,

The local clergy fraternal was a challenge to a new depth of friendship by one of its members. *"I think we should show our trust in one another by confessing our weaknesses and secret longings"* he said. They agreed and the Anglican Vicar began: *"My weakness" he admitted "is drink. I have to keep a careful watch or I could become an alcoholic".* The Roman Catholic Priest was equally frank. *"I miss female company. I would love to take an attractive girl for a meal and a chat, but of course I dare not."* The Methodist Minister was encouraged to unburden herself. *"I'm so hard up she said and my pay is so pathetic. There are times when I feel I would like to take twenty or thirty pounds out of the collection to buy myself a lovely pair of shoes."*



By this time, the Welsh Presbyterian Minister was getting very agitated. He kept shuffling his feet and looking at his watch. *"Must go, must go"*, he kept on repeating. But the others insisted that before he departs he should also declare his weakness. *"Well" he said "Since you insist. My problem is that I am a terrible gossip and quite honestly I can't wait to get out and tell all my friends the things I've just heard!"* And with that he disappeared out of the door!

Temptations and secret longings and desires AND WORRIES are of course some of the key things we think about in Lent. But one of the key things the above story stresses is that trust is so important in helping live out our Christian lives Trust that if we are honest about ourselves and our lives, then people will accept us for who we are, despite, our weakness and failings, and help support us.

It has been said that temptation is a test which comes to a person whom God wishes to use. The word temptation means testing and it reminds us that the person who attempts to live for God will be tested. And at such times we dare not go it alone. We need God's help and each other to keep us from falling. But can we truly trust each other in Christ to be honest and open and feel we are not judged. At a Deanery level to we are challenged to seek deeper levels of trust and understanding between our congregations. We can only do that by being open and by meeting each other. Yet the temptation is to say that the Deanery is nothing to do with me. I will stay in my small corner. I am only concerned with my church. And the minute we do that we put boundaries on our love and faith, and our spirituality starts to wither and die.

The season of Lent asks each of us some searching questions

Do I truly love?	Am I joyful?	Am I a sharing person?	Am I peaceful?
Do I exercised kindness, gentleness and forgiveness?	Am I open and trustworthy?		

All of us fail at times, but the work of God's spirit is to challenge us and to enable us to change. And when a person is willing to trust and be changed, then the Holy Spirit can make remarkable transformations.

Are we willing to be changed? Are we?

Its the time of year again when many of us start to look forward and start planning things like

gardening and DIY projects and even visiting car boot sales. Unfortunately there are people out there who will also be planning, but may be travelling around the area driving up and down the street where you live, visiting farms and businesses and looking for the opportunity to take what is yours. They'll take anything that can be quickly thrown in a van or the back of a pick-up.

Pretend you're the criminal for a minute and have a look around your property, what do you think a criminal would be interested in. Garden sheds, cars, central heating fuel, kids bikes, tools? Think what you could do to prevent you being the next victim.

Just make sure things are put and locked away at night. The kids bikes, lawnmowers for example. Make sure cars are locked and don't leave anything in them. OVERTON MEDICAL PRACTICE

You may have been observant and noticed that we do not close the doors at lunch time now. There is a receptionist on duty and it means we don't have such a stampede of calls at 2pm when the telephones used to be switched back on. The only time the doors are now closed is the last Wednesday in the month when we have a Staff Meeting from 1 – 2pm and for the afternoons of staff training.

We have instigated a new method for prescribing to patients who are on the same medication/dosage and likely to remain so for the foreseeable future. Dr Bowdler is leading this initiative but you can request this service from any of the doctors in our practice and it is only available through Overton Chemist at the moment. A 12 mth supply of your medication will be issued by the doctor directly to the chemist who will dispense to you as requested by the GP. This means that you do not have to request repeat prescriptions, but only for those medicines that fall into the long term category. The prescriptions that request this service are labelled 'Automatic' to differentiate from the normal scripts.

Home delivery service of medication has proved to be very beneficial to a considerable number of patients who are elderly and in some cases housebound. This service is provided for those who have trouble getting about or have to rely on others to help them if they are living on their own or have mobility problems. Do remember anyone aged 65+ can have the 'Pneumonia Vaccine', a one off injection and can be done any time of the year – just ask!

What do 'they' do at meetings?

ary we were pleased to welcome a new member and a visitor to our group. It has been a chance to enjoy a time together and make plans for all our spring activities and outings, as well as listening to some interesting people.

Mrs Myfanwy Povey, a larger than life character, was Senior Lecturer of Midwifery & Health Studies, at Bangor University until her retirement. I think she can be forgiven for forgetting her projector on such a cold snowy evening in January, so she gave an impromptu talk about her varied life and career, starting from humble beginnings growing up in a large family in a rural Welsh village. In the 1960s it was a real challenge for a 16 yr old Welsh speaking girl to set off to train in nursing in *England* (Oswestry), yet alone work in Manchester and London. Her story was fascinating and her evident boldness, openness and courage and, most of all, humour kept us entertained. She has met some famous people along the way, and had gossip and stories to tell too. I wish I could meet the Dalai Lama on a train! Well done Myfanwy, these are the women that helped make all things possible for today's women. They 'blazed the trail'.

Malcolm Booth's talk, in February, was on his 10 yrs teaching in Borstal Norfolk, and he told us of many of the innovative ideas he managed to introduce to the troubled boys who were sent there. Many came from hard backgrounds and lacked education, barely able to read and write and Malcolm pushed to give them teaching time in between the trades they worked in during the daytime. He introduced City & Guilds courses so the boys could leave with qualifications, and he managed to get boys into college to study GCEs. Although each boy would travel independently to and from the college, no boy absconded. A drama group was established and won a local competition with their play – such a morale booster. Boys helped at a hospice for young people, and some joined the Army Cadet Force, both with independent travelling and again no boy absconded. The success rate for Borstal then was 97% that says it all!

Inspiring people eh! We often take a risk making a booking for a talk/demonstration/hands on event but as these speakers demonstrate –that is what life is all about! We have a varied programme of events planned from cookery, to Chinese brush painting to Aloe Vera. Why not join us and make a difference. (See Page 8 for next meeting)

Overton Sports and Social Club 1968 to 1979

Following the article by Betty Williams on the history of the Cocoa Rooms Oracle in last months Oracle, Ivor Parkinson, Founder Chairman of the Overton Sports & Social Club writes about the early days.

There used to be a Billiard/Snooker room in what is now the main clubroom of the Club, with a table which has a history of its own. It was made from a sailing ship's timbers as recorded on the plaque at the end of the table. It was given to the village by Major Peel of Bryn-y-Pys. By 1968 use of the room had declined until the last villagers, Hughie Gregory of Bryn-y-Pys Home Farm, Sgt Smith, Bill Bloor and Geoff Hughes, stopped playing. The Village Hall Management Committee locked the room to prevent it from being vandalised.

To avoid losing the facility forever, Tom Haynes arranged an informal meeting with Bill Bussey, Ron Cox (all 3 now dead), Den Owen, Raymond Haynes and myself to look into the possibility of re-opening the room and trying to revive some interest in billiards and snooker. A committee was formed with me as Chairman, Ron Cox as secretary and Raymond Haynes as Treasurer. We re-decorated the room with paint from Noreen Haynes' shop at the Hermitage, Willow Street, which along with building materials was purchased on a 'pay when you can' basis. Later we successfully applied for a liquor licence and we asked the Village Hall Committee to re-locate the Library to what is now the Parish Room, and created what is now the bar and television room. They also let us have the store room which was located between the Library and the snooker room. We then met a representative from Watney's brewery who obtained a gift of £500 (this meeting took place on a freezing winter evening huddled around a small one bar electric fire in the library as there was no heating in the snooker room) which was used to build the bar and it is still in use between the store room and the library. This involved a lot of demolition work, removing rubble using a tractor and trailer provided by Mick Huntbach of Trench Farm and Tom Williams of Cae Dyah, who were both on the committee.

In 1969 the new bar and lounge was opened and villagers were invited to become members. The bench seating was purchased at a sale on Penley Camp for 50p each. All the work was done on a voluntary basis with Committee members sharing bar duties. Money was in short supply so fund raising was always going on, which included a 2 day fete held on the football field with a couple of committee members sleeping in the beer tent to protect the contents and culminating with a dance in a large marquee. One of the attractions in the afternoon was a piano smashing contest, great fun to watch! After further discussions with the Village Hall committee, their new kitchen was built, and the club could go ahead and build the present "snooker room", toilets and committee room, with all the steel girders purchased from Ifton Colliery. The second snooker table was bought from "The Swallow Club" in Whitchurch for £25, dismantled and brought to Overton in T.L. Haynes half ton van, carried upstairs and reassembled in its present position. One of the girders was used to replace the entrance door and wall to make room for the present bar area for the club room. At a later date the Cellar was extended and the Pool room built above it. The bar was manned by committee members for the first 10 years, with the cellar and Beer Pipes cleaned every Sunday morning, along with restocking the bar, cleaning the club rooms and ironing both snooker tables.

Watneys, now Carlsberg Tetley have always been very helpful with interest free loans for furniture purchases etc and membership rose quite regularly nearly 500 at one period. In 1979 the club had it's liquor licence taken away for a period of 6 months after more than 20 police personnel including constables sergeants, plain clothes and Inspectors raided the premises with a search warrant, resulting in about half a dozen members being prosecuted for drinking 20 minutes after the prescribed closing time, but still within the half hour drinking up time, so we all drank Coke and orange juice until the licence was restored and the club was renamed "Overton Recreational Club".

DOUBLE YELLOW LINES

Overton Community Council are concerned that sometimes motorists are parking outside Rowlands Chemist in the village to pick up items from the chemist or visit the doctor's surgery. Some of the parked vehicles are causing an obstruction due to the position in which they park (other road users have to manoeuvre around them on the tight bend). Behind the surgery is the public carpark with a connecting door that brings you to the front of the doctors.

Wrexham County Borough Council have suggested that double yellow lines placed on this section of road is the only solution and Overton Community Council are seeking the views of the village, bearing in mind that this is part of the conservation area, before any decision is taken to install these lines and we would like to hear residents' opinions.
