#### SALOP ROAD'S CHELSEA PENSIONER by Alan Jones

Next to the former Bryn y Pys Arms until it was demolished in the second half of the last century stood a row of three small cottages. At the time of the first census (1841) the Duke family lived next to the pub. George, age 45 an agricultural labourer born in Chester was "Head", and his wife Margaret was 48. Margaret was a widow when they had married at St John' Church, Chester in 1837. They had a daughter Ann, aged 2, and Margaret's mother Elizabeth Roberts also lived with them. She died in 1853 aged 80 having lost her sight.

They were at the same house in 1851. George was now a bricklayer's labourer but is also stated as being a Chelsea Pensioner. He was an Out Pensioner, one who had served his time or had been invalided as a result of wounds. Out Pensioners were eligible ex soldiers who could not be housed in the hospital as there were more Pensioners than places. They received their pension from the Royal Hospital but lived outside. In 1703 there were only 51 Out Pensioners by 1815 this figure had risen to 36,757.


George had joined for the 11<sup>th</sup> (North Devon) Regiment of Foot in Barnstaple, Devon on 12<sup>th</sup> August 1813 when he was aged seventeen. He was to serve 22 years & 90 days, including serving 7 years on Gibraltar, 15 mths in Portugal and 8 yrs 3 mths in the Ionian Islands, a British Protectorate from 1813 until their secession to Greece in 1864.

He left the Regiment on 8<sup>th</sup> November 1836 after an examination at Chatham General Hospital where he was declared unfit for service and likely to be permanently incapacitated for military duty by chronic rheumatism, his strength and activity failing. It was also stated that he was much debilitated by long residence in a warm climate and having a weakening of his left wrist from a fall.

Upon discharge he was aged 39, 5 feet 6½ inches tall with brown hair, hazel eyes and a brown complexion. He never rose above the rank of Private. George died in April 1861 aged 64, although the burial record shows 68. He is buried in Overton Churchyard as is Margaret who died in August 1862 aged 69.

Was he Overton's only Chelsea Pensioner?

these paintings too smaltzy and glitzy. And I know they are not really what you would call great art. But somehow they speak to me, and I guess that is the secret to art, whether it touches your heart.

Kinkade is really famous for his Christmas paintings of snow covered streets and cottages, that are infused with a warm and glowing light. We have one on our living room wall, which I love and Sue is ambivalent to. It is called Cobblestone Christmas and it is a Cotswold scene of a stone bridge with a stream and a cluster of snow covered cottages.

Kinkade says this of the painting: 'In cobblestone Christmas, light spills from the windows of every home and suffuses into the crisp winter air, where it mingles with the incandescent fires of the setting sun. God and man have truly collaborated in a celebration of the season." Thomas Kinkade is a Christian and for him the light that suffuses his paintings symbolises the light of Jesus in our world.
